

## Getting an Idea...

#### The Business Plan

The first step in starting a business is putting together a plan. There are many factors that go into putting together a business plan. These factors include an **Outline of Goals, Marketing Strategy, Financial Management, Operation Schedule.** 

- Outline of Skills/Goals
  - -What are the goals of the business?
  - -Who owns the business?
  - -What advantages do you have?
- Marketing Strategy
  - -What market do you serve?
  - -How will you market/advertise your product?
  - -How will you price your product?
- Financial Management
  - -Where will you find funding?
  - -What is your operating budget?
  - -What are your immediate/extended costs?
- Operation Schedule
  - -Who will manage day-to-day operations, and how?
  - -What type of employees will you need?
  - -What equipment/facilities will be needed?

The Small Business and Development Center provides free counseling in writing a business plan. The Mitchell County Development Authority and the Chambers of Commerce also have a comprehensive *How To Start A Small Business* guide. See the back of this brochure for contact details.

#### **Legal Structures**

Before beginning a business, you must consider a legal structure that protects you and your assets from liability.

<u>Sole Proprietorship</u> - An individual owns the business, but is also liable for debts of that business.

<u>Partnerships</u> - Two or more people share profit/expenses/ operations. A *limited partnership* allows individuals to share in the profit/loss of a business, but not the operations of the business.

<u>Corporation</u> - Licensed by the state, this model allows the selling of common or preferred stock. This model will also be taxed twice: once on the business and second on stock dividends.

<u>Limited Liability</u> - A mixture of partnership and corporation, this structure allows partners to own and operate their business while shielding themselves from liability.

<u>Note</u>: Please consult with a legal professional before building a legal structure. Call the Mitchell County Development Authority for a list of lawyers.

## Getting Financed ...

Although it is a common belief that free grants are available to support small business start-up and growth, this is <u>not true</u>! There is no such thing as free money.

However, there are many low-interest loans and financial support programs which can help you start and grow your business. A few of these resources are listed below. Contact the Mitchell County Development Authority for more information and updates

Small Business Administration Loans - This federal loan program helps small businesses acquire guaranteed capital at a fixed rate. P&C Bank (229-336-5271) and Pelham Banking Company (229-294-2341) are both approved SBA Loan institutions.

OneGeorgia Small Business Loan Guarantee - This state loan program is similar to the SBA Loan program. It guarantees 50% of a loan for small business financing; especially in rural Georgia. **USDA Loans** - This federal program offers financial assistance to small businesses. It is specifically designed to grow business in rural areas. Please visit www.rurdev.usda.gov or call 229-336-0170

**Downtown Development Authority** -The Camilla DDA & Pelham Better Hometown assists small business and property owners with the Facade Revolving Loan Program. This program lends low-interest loans to improve the visual image of a property. The loan can only be used for exterior repairs.

Micro-loans - This special type of loan is administered by non-profit organizations to support low-income, low-employee entrepreneurs. For more information on microloans, contact the Southwest GA Regional Development Center at 229-522-3552 or www.swgrdc.org

## Getting Licensed...

**Getting licensed with the state** - Certain businesses require licensing with the state. Contact the Secretary of State's office (see the back panel) to see if your business requires special licensing.

**Licensing and Sales Tax ID** - Your business may be required to obtain a seller's permit, and all businesses must receive a Tax ID. Contact the Georgia Department of Revenue and the Federal Internal Revenue Service to obtain these permits (See the back panel).
